Entry drop off day: Tuesday, July 25, 2023 from 1-7 p.m. Perishables must be entered but can be dropped off until 8:00 a.m. Thursday, July 27, 2023. All exhibits must be in place by 8:30 a.m. Thursday, July 27, 2023. Judging begins at 9:00 a.m. on Thursday, July 27, 2023. \*\* If you are unable to enter your items online, please enter in person at the Buffalo County Fair office. Deadline for entry in person is Tuesday, July 25, 2023 10:00 a.m. No late entries accepted. All Tags will be ready for pickup from 1-7 p.m. on Tuesday, July 25, 2023.

Awards will be made according to merit. No awards will be given to articles not worthy. Premiums paid only on articles listed in this information. Stickers will be awarded unless ribbons are requested. Blue is first place; Red is second place and White is third place. Plates and containers will be furnished except if noted. Two entries may be exhibited under each number listed under each class. Exceptions are 2B Feature Exhibit and 3B Youth Exhibit, one entry only. Check for quantity required for exhibit.

#### 1B. GARDEN COLLECTION

Subject to the following rules: Entrant must be approved by the superintendent.

Space will be assigned by the superintendent. \$100 to \$225 will be prorated by the number of exhibits, according to the number of points earned by each collection.

Collection will be judged on artistic arrangement, classes represented, and number of premiums.

Individual premiums won by entries will count as follows:

The measurements of a standard case box slot are 2.75 inches long x 2.75 inches wide x 9 inches high (7 cm x 7 cm x 22.9 cm). Bottles may be of any color and must be free of ink, paint, or paper labeling other than competition entry labels. Obliterate any lettering or graphics on the cap with a permanent black marker. Bottles with Grölsch-type swing tops and 22 oz Bomber bottles are not allowed. Corked bottles and odd-shaped bottles are acceptable as long as they can fit in a standard case box slot (2.75 inches L x 2.75 in W x 9 in H; 7 cm x 7 cm x 22.9 cm). Bottles with raised lettering are acceptable if they fit in a standard case box slot. Mead and Cider must be submitted in two (2) bottles as defined for the Beer entries or one 750 ml wine bottle. Bottles not meeting the above requirements will be disqualified. - 1. Open to any amateur wine maker. Wine must be homemade. Commercial wines and wine makers may not enter.
- 2. Entries must be submitted in a 750 ml wine bottle. Only one bottle per entry is needed in all classes. Still wines should be in cork finished bottles. Sparkling wines should be champagne corks as well as a wire closure for the safety of all involved.
- 3. Entries shall bear no labels, markings, or bottle decorations, other than Official Entry label. Entries bearing such will be refused.
- 4. There is no limit to the number of entries per exhibitor. All entries in the same class by an individual exhibitor must be different.
- 5. The judge's decision will be final.
- 6. Only the Superintendent, Judges, Stewards, and Scorekeeper will be allowed in the judging area.
- 7. Exhibitors & spectators are not allowed to converse with judges during the competition. Violators will be disqualified or asked to leave the building.
- 8. Judges and Superintendents will not be allowed to enter wines for competition in any class which they are judging.
- 9. All bottles will be disposed of after the Fair.
- 10. Wine kits and concentrate-based wines will compete side-by-side with fresh fruit and juice-based wines in all listed classes.
- 11. It is entirely up to the Exhibitor to decide which classes you should enter. You should enter each wine in the class in which you feel it will perform best. Wines must contain a minimum of 75% of designated type if entered as a varietal. Varietals of less than 75% must be entered as blends. To make sure all entries are judged fairly, the Judges may re-classify an entry that is obviously in the wrong class or has over 75% percentage of a specific varietal but is entered as a blend.
- 12. All wines will be judged according to their relative merits within the class.
