All entries close Monday July 21, 2025 at Midnight. No entries will be received/accepted after that time.

Entry drop off day: Tuesday, July 22, 2025 from 1-7 p.m. Perishables must be entered but can be dropped off until 8:00 a.m. Thursday, July 24, 2025. All exhibits must be in place by 8:30 a.m. Thursday, July 24, 2025. Judging begins at 9:00 a.m. on Thursday, July 24, 2025.

** If you are unable to enter your items online, please enter in person at the Buffalo County Fair office. Deadline for entry in person is Monday, July 21, 2025 4:00 p.m. No late entries accepted. All Tags will be ready for pickup from 1-7 p.m. on Tuesday, July 22, 2025.

Awards will be made according to merit. No awards will be given to articles not worthy. Premiums paid only on articles listed in this information. Stickers will be awarded unless ribbons are requested. Blue is first place; Red is second place and White is third place. Plates and containers will be furnished except if noted. Two entries may be exhibited under each number listed under each class. Exceptions are 2B Feature Exhibit and 3B Youth Exhibit, one entry only. Check for quantity required for exhibit.

1B. GARDEN COLLECTION

Subject to the following rules: Entrant must be approved by the superintendent.

Space will be assigned by the superintendent. \$100 to \$275 will be prorated by the number of exhibits, according to the number of points earned by each collection.

Collections will be judged on artistic arrangement, classes represented, and number of premiums.

Individual premiums won by entries will count as follows:

First Premiums, 100 points

Second Premiums, 75 points

Third Premiums, 50 points

A garden collection shall consist of at least one (1) entry from any twelve (12) of the thirty-six (36) Classes listed (which include fruit and nuts). Displays will be judged for quality, quantity and general appearance. Classes do not include 2B Feature Exhibit or 3B Youth Exhibit for Garden Collection.

2B. FEATURE EXHIBIT

FOOD BASKET — ONE PER FAMILY

Entry will be shown in a bushel basket turned on its side. Baskets are furnished by the fair board. Baskets will be set up by the superintendent prior to exhibiting. No decorations may be placed on the baskets. Entry to be an assortment of fresh edible garden products consisting of any six (6) or more vegetables in a suitable amount to exhibit in a bushel basket. For example, all peppers count as one kind of vegetable. Baskets will be judged for artistic effect, quality and general appearance. No canned goods. Feature entries will be shown in a group, separate from garden collection or other exhibits. Prizes won on this entry cannot be counted for score in garden collection. Baskets in place by 8:30 a.m. on Thursday, July 24, 2025.

MINI FOOD BASKET — ONE ENTRY PER CHILD

For example, all peppers count as one kind of vegetable. Entry will be shown in an apple basket turned on its side. Baskets are furnished by the fair board and will be set up by the superintendent prior to

exhibiting. No other decorations are to be placed on the baskets. A cloth may be placed under the vegetables in the basket. The basket must be arranged at time of entry, by the youth only. They will be judged on quality, variety and arrangement. All basket displays must be in place by 8:30 a.m. on Thursday July 24, 2025.
